

Research methodology

We collected nationally representative telephone survey data throughout 2021 from more than 24,000 respondents from four carefully selected countries: **Mozambique, Sierra Leone, Tanzania and Uganda.**


We merged the cleaned data with external datasets including data on the spread of COVID-19; policy countermeasures; conflict events; climate; public infrastructure; and on food prices.

For the descriptive, causal, and predictive data analyses, we used a range of statistical and econometric methods, such as multivariate regressions and machine learning.

Key findings

We observed that people across Africa faced extreme economic, social, and health

challenges during the pandemic that have fundamental implications for their behavior, livelihoods, and overall well-being.

The negative impacts in **different domains** are strongly interlinked and create **compounding challenges**.

We documented **worrisome impacts of the pandemic on food security** for about 30% of households, with considerable variation across and within the four countries (Graph A).

Furthermore, the prevalence of mental health problems such as **depression and anxiety disorders increased significantly** (Graph B).


Relatedly, all countries reported increases in intra-household tensions (Graph C).

For all variables across all countries, the share of affected households is higher among those who saw losses in income or livelihood, likely deepening inequalities.
